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ADMI Presents Early Learnings of Study to Partners of Global Postharvest Loss Initiative

In early 2014, the ADM Institute for the Prevention of Postharvest Loss (ADMI) received a grant of \$500,000 from the Rockefeller Foundation to conduct a study in support of an international, multi-institutional initiative, called the Waste and Spoilage in the Food Chain Development Initiative. The goal of this study, the Global Learning Assessment, is to identify successful findings in global postharvest loss, scaling promising solutions, and promoting small holders in the adoption of postharvest loss prevention technologies and practices. In April 2014, Principal Investigator, Steve Sonka, presented the Early Learnings Report at a partner meeting in . Nairobi, Kenva.

The Global Learning Assessment is focused on addressing a key question to postharvest loss prevention efforts - given that proven technologies and practices to reduce postharvest loss exist, why don't farmers around the world employ them? As described in the Early Learning Report, the assessment's investigators find that for postharvest loss, the process of how an intervention is conducted appears to be as important to look at as the chosen intervention itself.

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concepts' on process factors which shape the impact of future postharvest loss interventions. Based on insights of ADMI staff assimilated from prior work to enhance agricultural systems and reduce postharvest loss, the report is grouped into five areas - insights from innovation, systems perspectives, technology services, measurement, and economics. At the stakeholders meeting, Sonka also presented the
